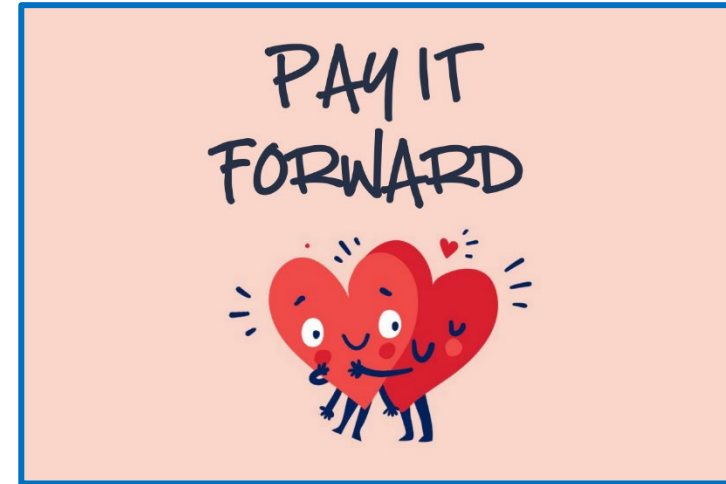

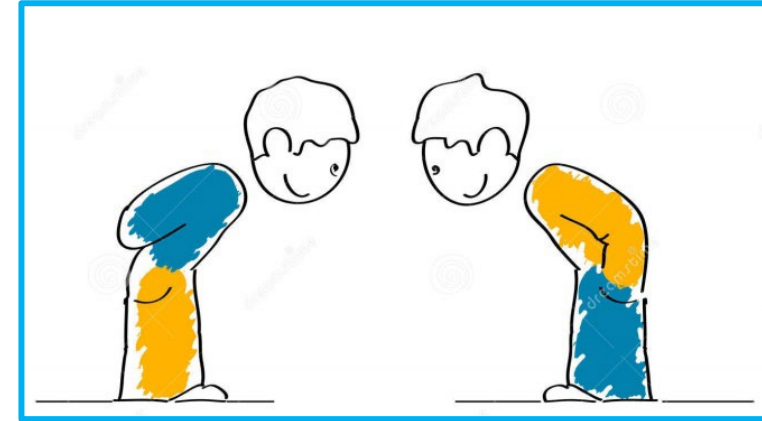

SCHOOL RULES AND REGULATION

When students commit minor offences, they will face one or more of the following disciplinary actions:

- Immediate corrective measure
- Confiscation of items
- Verbal warning
- Parental involvement
- Detention or corrective work order
- Conduct Grade may be downgraded

When students commit serious offences or repeated minor offences, firmer disciplinary actions will be taken:

- Downgrading of Conduct Grade
- Issuance of School Warning Letter
- In-house suspension
- Out-of-school suspension
- Caning
- Expulsion

*The students' conduct is assessed at the end of each semester. This is to allow students to reflect and improve on their conduct for the following semester.

POLICY ON USE OF TECHNOLOGY

Use of Personal Learning Devices (PLD) and other own devices

Staff and students are expected to use technology resources, including Personal Learning Devices (PLD) and other own devices such as laptops/tablets/mobile phones in an appropriate manner which is consistent with the School's Acceptable Use Policy and recognises the rights and feelings of others. Consideration must be given at all times to the possible effect of one's actions when using technology at school or at home.

Students are expected to keep their PLD safely stored in the student's bag or locked in their designated locker when not in use. The School is not responsible for lost or stolen devices.

Use of Social Media Networks

With regards to the use of social networking sites (e.g. Instagram, TikTok, etc.):

1. Users should not access social networking sites unless expressly permitted by the school and/or as part of a specific learning activity
2. Users shall be discerning when accessing websites. They shall avoid websites of unknown or disreputable origin.
3. Users shall be responsible for all content that they upload, post, email, transmit or otherwise make available via the school network.
4. Users shall not upload or download, send or post, enter or publish any content to the internet that is objectionable or illegal under the Singapore Law.
5. Users shall not upload or download, send or post, enter or publish any content to the internet that is against the public interest, public order, national interest, racial and religious harmony, or which offends good taste or decency, or is otherwise indecent, obscene, pornographic or defamatory.
6. Users shall be mindful of public nature of the internet and shall not discuss or disclose confidential and proprietary information of the school or any organisation.
7. Users shall be respectful to staff and students and their rights for privacy.
8. Users shall be mindful of the need to protect their own privacy.

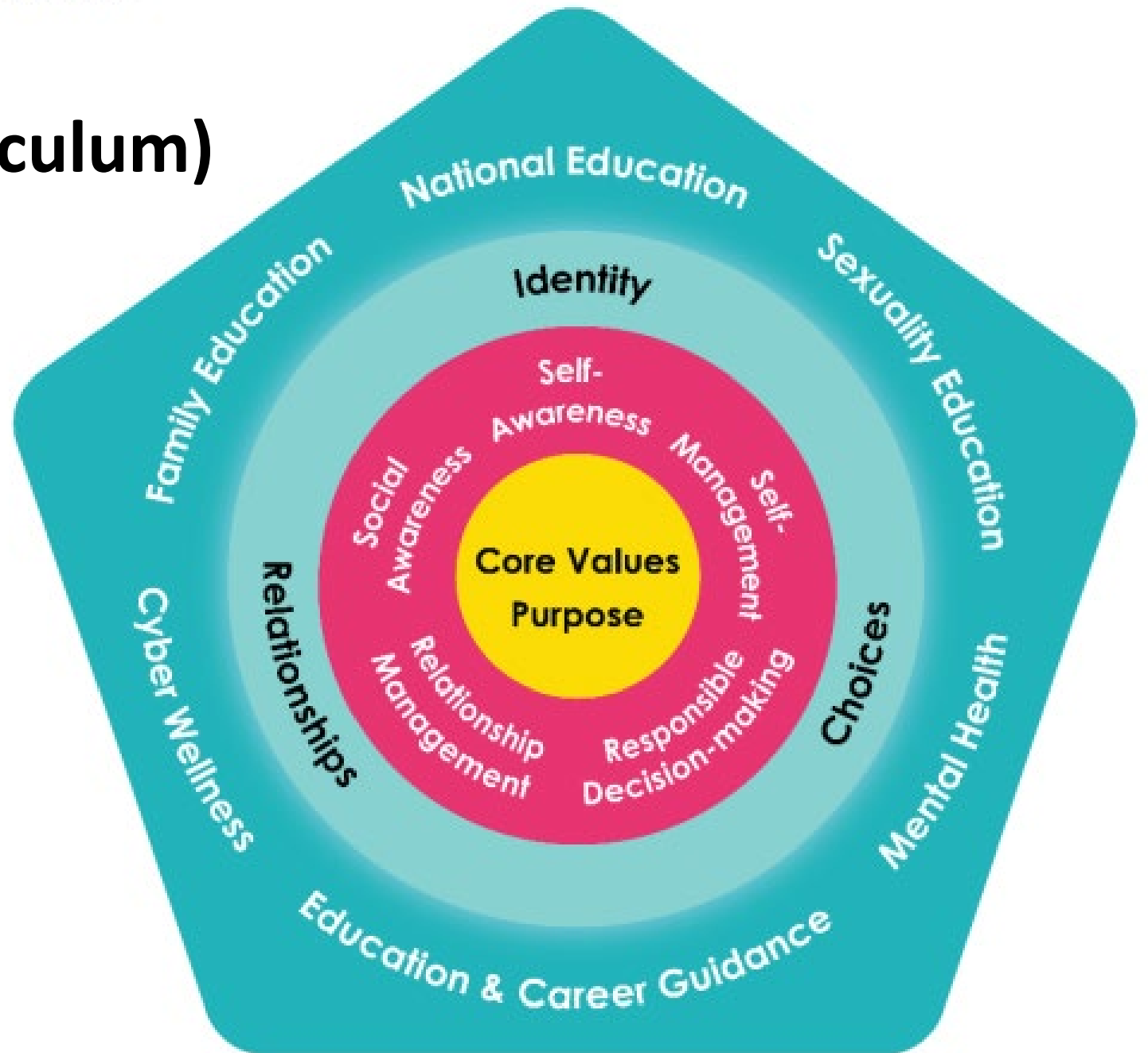

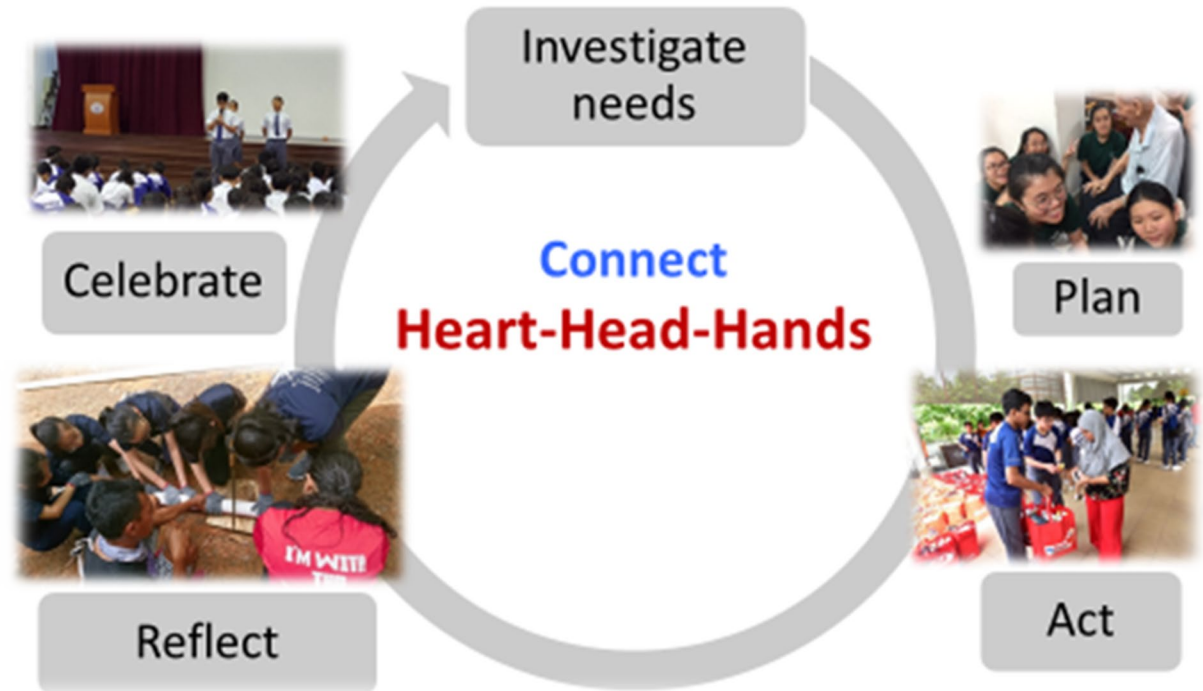

Student Management

“ **Learning** takes place where there is **order and discipline** so the child may grow in self respect and integrity ... ”

Rationale for Student Management

School is a common place for all to live and learn together. Hence, the compliance to a common code of conduct and behaviour is necessary to safeguard this harmony.

Flag Raising Ceremony

- All students to assemble at hall for FRC by 7.45 am
- Students are not allowed to be in the classroom before FRC
- All classrooms will be locked at the end of the day. Chairman will draw the keys to the classrooms daily

Attendance & Punctuality

- School rules are necessary to inculcate good habits to reflect self-discipline and responsibility.
- Students are required to be present at the assembly point before **0750 h every day.**
- Attendance in school for all students is compulsory so that he/she is in school to learn.
- If a student is unable to attend school because he/she is unwell, he/she must obtain a **medical certificate** from a registered doctor to validate his/her absence from school.
- All documents to validate a student's absence from school must be submitted to the Character Coaches immediately after the student returns to school. Students who **do not produce the necessary documents** to account for his/her absence will be **subjected to disciplinary action**

Promoting a Positive School Culture

- Be in school before 7.45 am daily
- Be properly groomed
- Students can only eat & consume sweet drinks in the canteen
- Use of mobile devices is restricted to foyer and canteen area only
- Timely submission of quality homework
- ACE your classroom- A(arrange furniture) C(clean the whiteboard, floor)
E(empty the bin)
- Be Safe during lessons
- Be in the correct attire

Expectations for Teaching & Learning

- Students are to behave in a manner (Seated, Awake, Focused, Engaged) that promotes a conducive environment for learning. Students who exhibit disruptive behaviour during a lesson can be taken out of the classroom and serve time-out at the foyer so as to reflect on their behaviour
- Students are expected to complete assignments or homework given by fulfilling the requirements and deadlines set by the subject teachers.
- Students are to remain in their designated seats (as decided by their CCs) at all times unless permission is given by the subject teachers to proceed to another seat.
- Students are to ensure that the classroom is keep clean and neat at all times.
